



- The topics were well accepted and offered an alternative approach into the diversity of sports medicine.


-The topics included a glance into the communication between organs within the human body via hormones and what the future holds in terms of physiology and exercise medicine.




SOUTH AFRICAN JOURNAL OF SPORTS MEDICINE

New papers in the South African Journal of Sports Medicine are posted as soon as they have gone through the peer review process and have been accepted for publication. By joining the mailing list or following the journal on Twitter- @SAJsportmed- members get notified a soon as a paper is published. The papers are free to download.

The South African Journal of Sports Medicine is already accredited by South Africa's Department of Higher Education and Training. This enables researchers at South African institutions to get a research subsidy following their publication in the journal. The journal is also registered in the African Journals Online database (AJOL), a platform of African-published scholarly journals. This database hosts 527 journals. The South African Journal of Sports Medicine is also hosted by the Directory of Open Access Journals) (DOAJ), which includes 16 489 journals from 126 countries in its database.

<u>SABINET</u> is another database which includes the South African Journal of Sports Medicine along with about 500 journals. Sabinet provides a searchable, collection of full-text African electronic journals. <u>SciELO South Africa</u> is an open-access searchable database of selected South African scholarly journals. The <u>SciELO</u> <u>SA</u> collection is indexed in the SciELO Network Global Portal. This greatly enhances the visibility of the papers in the South African Journal of Sports Medicine. All SciELO journals appear on the Web of Knowledge (WoK) search portal within the SciELO Citation Index.

The South African Journal of Sports Medicine is waiting for the outcome of the review for accreditation by the Web of Science. This is a lengthy process as the review considers historic and current publications. Once this happens the journal will be raised to the next level, which will attract more good quality papers. The editorial board is cognisant of the fine balance between quality and quantity of manuscripts. This explains why about 50% of the submitted manuscripts do not get published for not reaching the standard expected in the journal.

SASMA AND THE OLYMPICS/PARALYMPICS

The fact that both these events took place in 2021, speaks to the challenges everyone involved in the Games had to face to get that point. It also speaks to the overcoming of these challenges. The Games itself also reminded us, that beyond overcoming, we can also excel. In the game of sports medicine and the athlete/para-athlete, indeed, SASMA has excelled. The goal of this article, is to highlight some of the work from Team SASMA.

Dr Phathokuhle Cele Zondi (Past President, 2015 - 2017) is Chair of the Medical Advisory Commission for the South African Sports Confederation and Olympic Committee and Team Doctor, and was in Tokyo with Team SA.

Recently, Professor Jon Patricios (Past President 2009 – 2011 | 2013 – 2015) and Nick Webborn published an editorial in the British Journal of Sports Medicine titled "Prioritising Para athlete care" (1). In the article, Jon and Nick propose four key interventions, abbreviated to the acronym CARE, that may elevate the standard of sport and exercise medicine for athletes with disability. The four interventions are - Collaboration and integration, Adaptation, Research, and Education.

Undeniably, a leader in the field, Prof Wayne Derman (Past President 1997-1999), has published a number of papers on the para-athlete and the Paralympics. Two recent articles are highlighted here: -

The first is a consensus document titled "Para sport translation of the IOC consensus on recording and reporting of data for injury and illness in sport" published in the the British Journal of Sports Medicine (2). The aim of the consensus is to guide the Para sport researcher through the complexities and nuances that should be taken into consideration when collecting, registering, reporting and interpreting data regarding the para-athlete health.

The second paper, is an original study published in the Journal of Science and Medicine in Sport, titled "Promotion of Para athlete well-being in South Africa (the PROPEL studies): Profiles and prevalence of psychological distress" (3). The aim of the study was to describe mental health concerns of a representative sample of South African para-athletes. The authors surveyed 125 participants and found a high prevalence of psychological distress and anxiety among South African para-athletes, compared to the general population.


